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COMMUNITY PROFILE

The Borough of Sayreville, the home of Sayreville War Memorial High School, is a suburban community located in Middlesex County, 25 miles south of New York City and seven miles east of New Brunswick. Because of its proximity to the New York Metropolitan area, the population has grown from 10,000 in 1950 to approximately 43,000 in 2010. To accommodate the school-age population, there are four public and two parochial elementary schools, one upper elementary and one middle school, in addition to the high school. Sayreville is the home of such nationally known industries as Ameristeel Corporation, Co-Steel, E.I. DuPont DeNemours & Company, Green Tree Technologies, Guest Supply, Inc., Hercules, Inc., and Sabert Corporation.

SCHOOL PROFILE

Sayreville War Memorial High School includes grades 9-12. It has a 2021-2022 enrollment of 1710. The class of 2021 graduated 435 students.

Sayreville War Memorial High School has an extensive array of curricular offerings (on the standard, honors and advanced placement levels) designed to meet specific needs and interests of students. Special classes are available for remediation as well as for students with learning disabilities.
